EDITORIAL NOTES.

Mr. Nichol Jeffrey last week was unanimously tendered the liberal nomination for the legislative seat rendered vacant by the resignation of Mr. J. P. Dunaway. After taking several days to consider the nomination Mr. Jeffrey decided that he could not satisfactorily nominate and engage in a contest without serious interference with his business interests.

A plebiscite has been taken in Sweden on the question of the total prohibition of alcoholic liquors. 1,845,240 voted for prohibition and 10,471 against it. The vote for temperance was stronger in the small places than in the large cities. But this plebiscite has caused a great surprise, and has led to the conviction that at a date not far distant Sweden will entirely prohibit all spirituous liquors.

Judge Gidley has given his decision in the appeal of the appeal of John Treherne, of the Britannia Hotel, Georgetown, against his conviction by two magistrate for selling liquor in quantity greater than one quart at one time without license therefor under the Liquor License Act. The judgment says: "I reach the conclusion that there was on the part of the bartenders no breach of any of the provisions of the Act and I must declare this conviction bad." The evidence showed very clearly that the spirit of the law was violated by the magnitude of purchases at intervals of a minute of quantities of liquor. But Mr. Haynes claimed there were such distinct sales. It is reported that the License Department of Ontario will appeal to the Provincial Court.

One of the briefest descriptive articles of the season appears in the Canadian Magazine for October under the title "Galaxy: A Study in Optimism." The author is Miss Jane Pratt, a writer whose name is not yet very generally known. While it gives an impression of Galaxy in a commercial way, its chief charm lies in the naive manner in which an insight is given into the daily life and spirit of the people of this city of the foothills. A more serious article is contributed by Sirnet Jenkins, and entitled "Is the Old Roman Race Still Dominant?" in which the author claims for the people of Great Britain a perpetuation of the Roman type that once dominated the whole world. "Damascus the Temptress" is the title of a fine travel article by A. R. Soper, in which he has thought out a consideration of local government. Frank H. Weston gives a good account of the new Doulin in Northern Ontario, in which he predicts an important future for that part of the Province. There are other good articles and a number of absorbing short stories and sketches.

THE NIAGARA POWER AT BERLIN

Official Opening the Hydro-Electric Plant There Next Week
BERLIN OWNS ALL ITS PUBLIC UTILITIES.

Niagara Power is at the doors of the municipalities of Western Ontario, a ready servant. Its energies will be turning the wheels of industry, lighting the courts of commerce and illuminating the homes of a score and more of towns and cities within the electric zone before the snow flies.

The Hydro-Electric Commission, a state board appointed by the Province of Ontario, with splendid foresight, has decided to have a power plant woven into the transmission lines from Niagara Falls to Toronto on the East, Windsor on the West and Berlin on the North at the behest of a group of 35 municipalities.

It was a vast work, a unique piece of public ownership, which ensures to Ontario for all time to come—a cheap power, cheap light and cheap heat.

This line will be an object of interest to electrical engineers over the entire continent.

The official opening of this great public service is to be held at Berlin on Tuesday next and will be made the occasion of a three day demonstration.

The Ontario Cabinet, the Hydro-Electric Commission, the members of the Provincial Legislature, the mayors and editors of Canadian and American cities will attend.

Berlin was selected as the point at which this demonstration should be held because the movement to obtain Niagara power for the union of municipalities had commenced there, and it was the first municipality ready to receive it.

TO VICTORIA, B. C., AND BACK

A Transcontinental Trip in Which Intelligent People and their Knowledge of Our Country Were Attained.

6,000 MILES BY LAND AND SEA.

In our last issue we left our readers at the pretty country side of Kamloops, B. C. Just below Kamloops the Thompson River widens out into Kamloops Lake, a broad, beautiful, billig sheet of water along the south shore of which we ran for some twenty miles. At Savona the lake ends, the mountain close in again, and the series of Thompson River canons is entered, leading westward to the Fraser through marvelous scenery. From here to Port Moody, the nearest point on Pacific tide water, the C.P.R. was built by the Dominion Government and transferred to the company. The railway, unlike the one we called at Kamloops, a long narrow river, leaves the port for departure for the Oceanside gold fields.

Three miles beyond Ashcroft the mountainous press upon the Thompson River which cuts its way through a winding gorge of almost terrifying gloom and desolation, very fittingly named the Black Canon. As we proceed toward the coast and emerge from the canon the scenery soon becomes striking and peculiar. Our train runs along a shadowed ledge cut out of the rocky hillside on the irregular south side of the river, where the headlands are penetrated by trees and the ravines are spanned by lofty trees. This is a long stretch of the Thompson River, which, when it reaches the ocean, has many beautiful bays and flowers are profuse everywhere. Undoubtedly this city has a great future before it. The only fear for the imminent future, however, is that of the exploitation of the supplies of real estate. We were shown maps and blue prints of surveys for a new town adjacent to the city, planned to accommodate a city with a population of 25,000,000 people! It looks to us as if the purchasers of many of these high-priced lots will wait a good many months before they realize their purchase money. However, the optimistic spirit, wherever prevailing, is admirable.

During our stay in the city we were the guests of Dr. and Mrs. T. P. Hall, their pretty residence on Davis Street and enjoyed many courtesies at their hands. Dr. Hall is a native of Halton, a son of the late Squire Hall, of Hornby, and has prospered in the West. We also made frequent calls upon Dr. and Mrs. Frank Moore, Dr. and Mrs. Stark, Ernest Blaikie, James Chapman, his father William Chapman and his brother Joe, and Oscar Benson, all of whom are doing well, and think no other place in all the world can compare with their adopted city.

In next stop, Victoria, the beautiful capital of the Province, and our visit there will be described, and notes on our trip to Edmonton and through the northern sections of Alberta and Saskatchewan will conclude this somewhat lengthy series of descriptive articles.

circumference, we ran through Hastings and went on to Victoria, and in five minutes reached the young and enterprising city of Vancouver—the fourth in population of the cities of Canada.

Vancouver is now a great commercial city with a population of 15,000 and growing rapidly. It is the Pacific terminus of the C. P. R. and the nearest ocean port to Canada's great wheat lands. Capitalists are very seriously considering the shipment of grain to Europe by this route as soon as the Panama Canal is completed. Until May 1880, the site of the present city was covered with a dense forest. Its growth was rapid from that date, the first steamship arriving, then revealing from the surrounding forest, destroyed every building but one in the place. The past ten years its growth has been marvellous, and its extensive wharves and warehouses, fine railway facilities and buildings, are all of modern architecture and appointments. Its situation is almost ideal regarding picturesqueness, natural drainage, harbor facilities and business advantages.

At 12 miles from the ocean there is a long, straight, sheltered radial line, giving ample manifestation of the commercial enterprise and unbounded faith in the future. Its business blocks, churches, educational, municipal and government buildings are all of modern architecture and appointments. Its situation is almost ideal regarding picturesqueness, natural drainage, harbor facilities and business advantages.

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
