The heater was overturned and the oil catching immediately blazed up in volume setting fire to lace curtains and other goods. Kennedy then arriving on the scene from the cellar, wearing a pair of leather gloves, carried the stove and heating goods out to the street. With the aid of the fire, which looked extremely ugly for a minute or two, was subdued. The loss was adjusted by the insurance companies for \$1000.
