NEWS OF LOCAL IMPORT.

Methodist Sunday School Banquet. The annual banquet of the Methodist Sunday School will be held on Monday evening, 12th December.

Only a Few Months More. The annual meeting of the pattern maker for Hearshorn & Co., died at No. 5 Hearshorn Crescent, on Saturday after about three weeks' illness from typhoid. SOME OBSERVATIONS

About August, 1908, a large-type headline in the FINEST PRICES asked the question, "Should Milk Be Sold in the City?" and issued was made of a petition to Council asking for appropriation of property necessary to mark in the proper width. The answer to the question was affirmative and was only fully completed a few days ago, and now after twelve years the meditative look which sufficed at the handsome street allowance, and endeavor even now to figure out what it looked like when it resembled a lane.

The very persons labor and others enter into their labors is curiously illustrated in connection with the petition mentioned. The first name thereon was that of A. W. Hall, one of the very first settlers in the community, who came here to very early life and cleared the present Lynd farm fronting on Main Street. At the time of signing the petition to widen the old street he had probably followed through the woods as he fell in the early thirties, but was about eighty-seven years of age, and remained only four years longer. The last name on the petition was Thomas Perryman, son, at the time, with the exception of Mr. Hall, probably the oldest remaining settler. Both gentlemen were very fond of recounting experiences of the early days, when luxuries and accommodations were not so plentiful, but when good-fellowship and neighborly kindness were as good as ever since. Mr. Perryman passed away about eleven years afterward at the age of ninety-three years.

The gentleman presiding in the Council as before, at the time mentioned, was Mr. J. H. Pearson, who also saw very little fruitage of the action taken, as he passed away a few years later. Singularly enough, his memory of the corporation was clear. In the year mentioned was consequent upon the death in March of that year of Mr. W. H. Stoney, Acton's first Mayor—from 1823 until about 1850, and who had again been mentioned in the petition—only two months. Mr. Stoney would have been an ardent supporter of the proposal, had it come up during his incumbency. The Clerk of the Council when the petition was read had also passed away prior to the accomplishment of the project—Mr. Thos. T. Moore, in 1908.

So that these ancient and useful citizens, while realising a community's need, and taking preparatory steps to meet the need, like the prophets and kings who desired long, they died without the sight.

She passed away Monday, and the interment took place yesterday at Huntville. Mrs. Bomer died at Linwood, six years ago. He was a native of this county, his birthplace being at Hornby. Mrs. Bomer's relatives are Mr. and Mrs. Streetville. In the earlier days they were very frequent visitors here. Theirs was a goodly household and they were highly esteemed. Their five daughters survive: Miss Clara, at home; Mrs. H. Graham, at home; Mrs. G. Rutherford, Toronto; Mrs. John Musselman, Sask.; and Miss Edith, at Berlin.

Acton Boy Scouts' Parade. The monthly church parade of the Acton troop Boy Scouts was held last Sunday in the Baptist Church. A very appropriate sermon was preached by Rev. F. G. Burrell, D. D. The text was the Scout's motto, "Be Prepared." On the march to church, which was a very fine one, the boys' conduct was exemplary. Several visitors called at the drill hall and spoke highly of the movement, promising their co-operation. The hall will be open every Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday for drill. Visitors who are interested will be welcomed. The officers intend to form a patrol of boys between the ages of twelve and sixteen. Intending members are requested to call at the drill hall at 8 p. m. to-morrow evening.
