W. J. Gordon, Provincial Inspects of licenses, at Ottawa, says that the bar-keepers and hotel-keepers all over the province are living up to the law better than they have ever done be fore. It is in their own interests follow out the law, both in spirit and letter, but especially the former.

The initiative was taken by the directors and shareholders of the Traders Hank at the annual meeting on Theeday in a movement from with in banking circles for an efficient in dependent inspection. When questioned about it Hon. William Pugaley observed : "The whole matter is under advisement. can make no statement till it is deal with by the cabinet upon the return of the minister of finance."

The new form of marriage licens which is now being issued by the Deputy Registrar General is a decided improvement upon the one in use for neveral years. The principal change places upon the clergyman who performs the marriage ceremony . the whole responsibility of making returns to the Government. Formerly this duty devolved partly upon the person issuing the license. The new licenses were adopted lat January.

During the past year the amount of railway construction completed was surprisingly large. In Western Canada more than 1,330 miles of new grades were built, being divided amongst the different companies as follows :- Grand Trunk Pacific, 350 miles; Canadian Northern, 390 miles; C. P. R., 000 miles. A large amount of construction and grading was done in Saskatchewan which gained over 500 miles of steel. It is stated that C. P. R. construction during 1011 will be at least equal to and perhaps greater then that of 1910.

For the protection of property the Council has deemed it to be expedient to extend the fire limits. To this end the fire limits by-law was amended at the meeting on Monday evening to to cover all buildings within the limits of the corporation. Hereafter perraiselon must be obtained for the erection of new buildings, or remodelling of old ones, and all buildings thus erected or remodelled must be of stope. brick, coment blocks or concrete, or be sheated with metal siding, plaster or cement. The Council is taking steps to enforce this by-law in all cases.
