Does the daily or weekly paper which you welcome to your home, and pay for advertise intoxicating drinks and brewer's falsehoods?

Does it, friend? Please look and see.

The chances are that, you will find larger beer recommended, and perhaps display advertising and reading indices designed to popularise or defend the liquor traffic.

Perhaps it will confirm some disinterested quotation from a religious or temperance paper, admiringly fixed up to indicate opposition to temperance laws, or sympathetic for the saloon business.

Comparatively few of our great daily papers have been true enough in their self-sacrifice, their readers, or brave enough in relation to the drink fraternity, to cast out this class of advertising. They prefer cash to conscience.

But here is what a Kentucky paper said on this matter, and it is in substance what every daily and weekly newspaper should forthwith proceed to say:

"All contracts for whisky advertisements in the Ledger have expired, and from this date no whisky advertisements will appear in these columns at any price. If saloons people desire to expatriate on the merit (?) of any particular brand of their damnation, they can look elsewhere for a medium through which to extol their virtues. The Ledger makes no claim to sanctification, but it is a saloon-keeper tells us that six dollars a week for advertising in the Ledger has sold him \$1,200 worth of whisky. It makes us feel that we have been in a small measure responsible for the damage done, and we promise to 'shut up' more."

THE JAPANESE DENTIST

In most forms of industry and craftsmanship Japan is now regarded as a formidable rival of the Western nations. In the practice of dentistry, however, she seems to be delightfully primitive. The dental doctor in the land of Mikado draws teeth with his fingers without the aid of any instrument. He takes the head of the patient in such a way that the mouth must remain open. Then putting the thumb and index finger directly into the patient's mouth, he, as the case may be, draws five, six, or seven teeth at a time, the patient during the time being unable to close his mouth. The explanation of this prowess in drawing teeth is said to be due to the training the dental student undergoes in early youth. In a plank hall are driven in and the board is placed on the ground. The tyro has to pull out the nails without moving the board. To begin with, soft wood is used, and then harder wood up to oak or some wood even harder. When the apprentice can draw the nails from the hardest wood without moving it, he is proficient in his art.

TO REMOVE STAINS

French chalk, mixed with a little methylated spirits to the consistency of cream, if placed over a green spot in silk material, and then covered with brown paper, and ironed, will never fail to remove the stain. Tea, coffee, wine and fruit stains, are equally well removed by washing in boiling water containing ammonia, into which a little borax has been dissolved. Blood stains may be generally removed by pouring very hot water through the stained portion. An excellent method is to make a thick paste with starch, which should be applied if damp cloth over the place, leave for several hours, then wipe off the paste, and when the material is dry, wash vigorously. If brown paper be placed over the spot and a hot iron lightly pressed on the paper, the stain will immediately disappear. This is the best way of removing grease stains from books, papers and valuable prints.

PAPER TEETH NOW

One of the oldest uses to which paper has been put is that which has resulted in the manufacture of German artificial teeth. They should fit into their color well, and are less likely to warp than ordinary false teeth. When the wine-growers of Greece were badly off for wood with which to make barrels, out of the sheets of an "Athenian" paper an ingenious engineer constructed for him one use a small yacht, 20 ft. long. In the construction of the hull, rudder, masts, sails and rudder several thousand copies of the journal were used. Each plank required 2,500 leaves, and enormous care was used to procure the necessary solidity. Several countries have experimented with a view to utilising paper for the paving of roads and streets, but the cost was prohibitive.


