Pending the Absence of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Members of Cabinet and Compross

T.IMPERIAL CONFERENCE

CORONATION Ottawa, May 20th -After attending In the senate where Sir Charles Fitzpatrick, the deputy governor general gave the royal amont to a supply bill for thirty-four and a half million dollars, and all the other bills which had passed their third readings, the members of the House of Commons ceased work shortly before ten o'clock last night.

Just before the speaker left the chair t. I. Borden seked what business would be taken up when the house met on July 18th. "Probably reciprocity," was the laconic reply of the minister of finance.

The supply bill, which includes fivetwelfths of all the items not voted, is made up of main estimates for the current year, totalling over twenty six millions, supplementary estimates of elightly less than eight millions and \$350,000 of supplementaries for the previous facal year.




