-Galt sprinkled 5,000 gallons of oil on the streets last week.  
-The census enumeration commences this evening.  
-The banks will close on Saturday.

-Another Sunday with the mercury at 90° in the shade. That surely is the limit for May.  
-Halton Farmers' Institute annual excursion to the O. A. G. Guelph, will be held on Saturday, 10th June.  
-The 17th session of the Hamilton Annual Conference will be held in the Methodist Church, Galt, commencing to-day.  
-The by-law against fire crackers was well observed on the twenty-fourth. Very few cases of violation were heard.  
-Patrick Canfield was sentenced to Guelph for ten years in the penitentiary for assaulting and attempting to rob Mrs. Keough.  
-Dominion Day will be Acton's big day. The demonstration under direction of the Fire Brigade will have numerous attractions.  
-Four of Guelph's stolen list citizens were fined on Monday and two drinks \$1.00 and costs each, in Guelph Police Court.  
-Rev. Crawford Tate, of Haynes Avenue Church, St. Catharines, has declined the call of the First Presbyterian Church, Galt.  
-The advertisement of cattle stray in last issue of the Free Press resulted in their restoration to the owner the day the paper was issued.  
-The shooting of robins is an unpleasant, punishable by fines ranging from \$1 to \$20 under Sec. 8, of Chap. 263, revised statutes of Ontario.  
-The Fire Brigade is making preparations for a big crowd in Acton on Dominion Day, and have arranged for a simple entertainment for a town full of visitors.  
-There is a probability that a "Boost Club" may be organized in Acton shortly. One of the initial positions will be to secure the location of a chopping mill here.  
-The lawn tennis club will hold a tennis tea at the courts in the park next Tuesday evening at 6 o'clock. All members and non-members, including many parents of the young ladies.  
-According to the judgment of the high court no cigars, cigarettes, candy, ice cream or soft drinks may hereafter be sold on Sunday legally, even if the vendors do sell them during the day.  
-Thos. P. Kelly's Minstrels, consisting of forty colored artists, will be seen under canvas at the Park tomorrow evening. The Rainbow Band of twenty pieces will parade at noon.  
-Saturday, June 3rd, is King George's birthday, has been proclaimed a legal holiday throughout the Dominion of Canada. Only the banks and government offices will observe it publicly.  
-The annual graduation exercises of the Macdonald Institute, Guelph, took place Saturday afternoon on the campus, and a luncheon was served to over one hundred guests, including many parents of the young ladies.  
-The widened section of Mill Street has been graded this week under the supervision of Street Inspector Harvey and will be coated with broken stone and rolled as soon as the country stone-crusher is put in commission.  
-Mr. Robert Gibbons informs the Free Press that it is not necessary to go away from Acton to find an older horse than the one referred to in the Echo. Agnes, at 22 years old, Mr. Alexander McDonald has a horse bred and reared on the old homestead 24 years old, which is doing farm work well every day.

NEWS OF LOCAL IMPORT.

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TO DO GOOD AND FORGET NOT

Annual Sermon to Sons of England  
The members of Acton Lodge, Sons of England, accompanied by Messrs. John Hainsworth, D. D. G. M., and William Stricker, Past President, of Berlin, and several from Guelph, attended divine service in the Methodist Church last Sunday evening, when Rev. Dr. Ansell preached the annual sermon.  
At the outset the Dr. extended the members of the lodge a most cordial welcome on behalf of the members of the congregation and himself. He was glad they were bound together with the two links of patriotism and benevolence, and by the principles inculcated they were also bound to the Christian church. You represent different churches, but all the churches have certain great cardinal principles which are the same in all, and which are the essential principles of our Christian religion.  
The text comprised two clauses of verse 10, of chapter 13, of Hebrews: "To do good, forget not." You come, he said, as representatives of old England. Many of you, like myself, were born there. We are not ashamed of the land from which we come, and trust we shall all live so that our native land will never be ashamed of us. Memories of old England, the old home, and its beauties and glories were recalled.  
Proceeding the Dr. said: I speak to you tonight not only as Englishmen, but as to others of an order which endeavours to cultivate the grace of kindness and helpfulness, of being good and doing good, and to render such help as may be needed from time to time.  
Three factors in the principles of the order were then forcefully impressed: Methods, measure and motives. Important methods of service are to visit the sick, to minister to the widow and the fatherless, and to be ready with help as well as with word to help those in need. These methods call for sympathy, and result in kind words, encouraging expressions and the practical duty of administering help where needed. Don't send your gifts and benefactions, but take them to those who need them. Referring to the measure of help bestowed, it was shown that all are not circumcised alike; not all are able to do good to the same extent, but all are able to do good, but have some talent of service. Incidents in the annals of English history were given to show that its great benefactors included the great Lord Shaftesbury; the poor scholar, John Ruskin, the founder of the ragged schools, and the widow of Shaftesbury. All could do like Jesus, go about doing good. Life is only of value as it is spent in helping others. Never let any act near the good unless you hear the voice of God. Motives have an important part in service. If you want to make yourself really happy go about doing good to others. The selfish influence will always pay. The opportunities are everywhere. Some have said there is more true glory in drying the tear of a little child than in conquering an army. Make it a matter of principle every day to do a kind deed or speak a kind word.  
The real rose, the emblem of the order, was much in evidence. Every member wore a rose, as did also the pastor, the members of the choir and the ushers. The supply was donated by Bro. Zanjan, of Berlin.  
The anthems by the choir were well rendered and appropriate to the occasion. About fifty members of the order were present.  
People Encourage Manufacturers  
Two by-laws were voted on in Elora on Monday, one to assist the Elora Furniture Company with a loan of \$5,000 for the purpose of extending their factory, the other to give the T. H. Bissell Company a fixed assessment of ten years, the company's intention being to greatly extend their present business. Both by-laws carried almost unanimously, only four votes being cast against the former and but seven against the other.  
Guelph a by-law to loan the Independent Tire Company \$25,000, of which \$20,000 will be lent by the city and \$5,000 by J. W. Lyon, was carried by a vote of fifty-one over the necessary three-fifths. The company will erect a \$20,000 building, and will employ from 50 to 100 skilled hands the first year.  
Charlie Sney's Assistant Sent Down  
The Hamilton Spectator says: "The magistrate handed Leo Golden, the man who presented the almost eye-coloured, Galt, Ont., with the crepe colored optic last Sunday afternoon, a rather stiff package this morning when he sent him down for two months. Sney told the magistrate that he had been passing through Woodland Park young Golden called him yellow, and that when he went back to remonstrate with him he received several blows in the face. Golden declared that he had a witness to prove that the Chinaman did him first. The magistrate did not believe this evidence, saying that he had known Sney for a long time and he was a quiet, law-abiding citizen."
