DEATH OF REV. R. F. KELLEMAN

TWO AND A HALF YEARS HERE

This town was shocked at the news of the death of Rev. R. F. Kelleman, H. A., about midnight on Monday, after a very brief illness. Fortseveral weeks he was not feellog wall. A week ago last Sunday The conducted the services at St. Albany and that evening complained of being very weak and nervous. On Monday he was confined to his bed and notwithstanding skilful treatment and careful nursing he rapidly grew worse. At the end of the week his condition was very serious and his physician called jo an emlarat mitalde physician for consultation. The disgnosis was quite in barmony with that previousty arrived at. The trouble was a complete nervous breakdown accompenied by parels of the bowels. From Monday morning it was seen that recovery was impossible, and he passed quietly away about midnight. Rav. R. F. Kelleman was appointed to the rectorship of St. Alban's, Acton, and St. John's, Rockwood, by the late Bishop Damoulth, and assumed charge of the parish on the first of April, 1000. He came to Acton from Passale,

N. J., where he had been rector of the Anglican church for some time. He was trumstried, and was accompanied by his mother and two sisters who have since made their home with him at St. Alban's rectory. To them supecially this sudden bureavement has come with crushing force. The sym-

Y., from which he graduated in arts, subsequently taking his course in theology at the General Theological Seminary of New York. He was ordained some twelve years ago and ble first parish was in Pennsylvania, near Pittaburg. Later he took a charge in the north of New Jersey, and his last church in the United States was at Passaic, N. J. from whence he removed to Acton.

Mr. Kelleman was a feateful preach er and was energetto in the perform ance of his pastoral work. A parish such as his, with two churches and mombers widely scattered, entailed ardnous work. 


