This depreciation. money goes into a fund to provide for the installation of new equipment, as science produces it, to replace that in use as it becomes chalate.

The prices quoted are more favorable than those of five years ago, when Acton was quoted a price of \$38.50 per h. p. on a 000 h. p. contract. 
