—The local banks are now closing at 3 p. m., Saturdays at one o'clock.  
—Large quantities of turkeys have been coming in the past week or so.  
—There's a wonderful charm in these autumn days, when earth to her rest is returning.  
—Mr. N. Patterson is adding a 2x10 brick addition to rear of the Patterson block on Mill Street.  
—Oakville's tax rate was struck last week at 25 1/2 mills, and taxes are due on December 1st.  
—Officer Harvey has had the streets at the Town Hall corner neatly hauled, and a decided improvement.  
—Sheriff Moiz, of Berlin, died on Sunday. He has for many years been publisher of the Berliner Journal, of Berlin.  
—The local marksmen had great success in the swamps on Monday. A large number of rabbits and cottontails were secured.
