new subscribers and it has been deci-

ded to build new lines in several direc-

tions out of town through sections not

now covered. A large number of new

subscribers both among farmers and

citizens will shortly be added to Acton

exchange. The poles for the new lines

have arrived.

Contract Let for Boardmore Siding

The contractor for the excavation

and filling for new siding from the G.

T. R. Elliott to the Boardmore turn-

pike was let last week to the Mackay,

Paulin Construction Co., of Hamilton.

Work will be commenced at once.

A large number of teams are being em-
ployed and men are being brought in.

Camps for men and horses will be con-
structed and the work will be pushed

forward with dispatch. There are

about 45,000 yards of excavating and

filing to do for the two miles of siding.

Hydro-Electric Engineer Hires

mission.
