A MAN SUICIDED IN TORONTO

Who Registered as Fred J. McLean,
Acton, at Prince George Hotel,
on Christmas Eve
HE WAS FROM BRIN, HOWEVER
On Christmas afternoon Chief Law-
son received a telegram from Chief
Grassett, Toronto, requesting him to
look up the friends of "Frederick J.
McLean," who was found dead in his
room at the Prince George Hotel, To-
ronto, last morning.
The deceased arrived in Toronto on
Sunday evening and registered under
the above name, giving Acton as his
place of residence. After dinner he
told the clerk that he was going to
retire, and left a call for 7.30 o'clock
Christmas Day. The bell in the room
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
