CANT REPEAL LOCAL OPTION

In the Fifteenth Constituency in Ontario Local Option Was Sustained in Every One.

The result of the voting on Local Option by-law throughout the province on Monday was very gratifying to all who are working for the abolition of the bar rooms in this fair province.

By-law were carried in sixteen places, and would have been carried in nineteen more if it had not been for the three-fifths requirement. These municipalities carried it: Cassington, Lockwood, Kinloss, Harkiss, Blenheim, Pevey, Orillia, Elgin, and Harkiss.
