COLLECTOR'S ROLL RETURNED
Compliments to Collector Harvey for His Prompt and Efficient Work
RE-ENGAGED THE MUNICIPAL OFFICER

Council met on Monday evening in regular session. Members all present, Rose Hynde in the chair.

The Committee on Finance presented their third report and recommended payment of accounts as follows:

The report was adopted.

Collector Harvey presented the Roll of Taxes for 1911 and showed that every dollar of the rate assessed had been collected.

Moved by W. Cooper, seconded by Alex. Bell, that the Collector's Roll for 1911 be received and the Collector relieved of his duties respecting same.

The Committee on Finance at the same time to express its satisfaction with the very efficient work of Mr. Harvey, the collector, no extension of time being asked, and all the taxes for the year having been collected. -Carried.

The by-law for the appointment of Municipal Officer and Assessor for the year was introduced, read the required number of times and passed. John Harvey being appointed to the office at same salary as last year.

The Reeve informed the Council that he had decided to call a public meeting of property owners and citizens for next Monday evening to discuss the Hydro-Electric power question.

The First Session of the thirteenth Legislature of Ontario was formally opened yesterday afternoon when the Legislative Chamber was crowded with spectators. Imposing ceremonies marked the opening of the first session of W. H. Maple, of North Waterloo, Speaker. The only indication of a new policy in the Speech from the Throne was the references to co-operation between the Federal and Provincial Governments regarding immigration and the developments of the north.

ON MONDAY, January 22nd, a Local Option vote was taken in the village of Sherbrooke, in the County of Napierville, Quebec. The population of Sherbrooke is about four hundred, and the temperance sentiment of the community was expected to find pretty strong expression in the balloting. When the votes were counted, it was found that there was not a single ballot marked against the adoption of prohibition, which therefore will go into force in Napierville, unanimously endorsed by the electors who voted upon the question.

THE PROPOSAL to supply farmers of Ontario with Hydro-Electric power at very low rates is making satisfactory headway. Applications to the Commission from farmers in all parts of the province, but more especially in the western districts are being made. These petitions are signed by small groups of farmers and transmitted through the various County Councils. It has been decided that the work of stringing low-tension wires along the country roads will be commenced as soon as Spring opens. The work will be confined at first to one township. Wires will be strung and the power will be supplied to the farmers in that particular area.

There will be in the position to make a detailed report on the cost of installation and supply, and other township will know exactly what the system will cost before it is installed.
