Lines on Headstones in Canada

Change With the Years. It may surprise some to know, but it is movertheless true, that there is a fashion in whitapha, changing not so quickly indeed as in woman's drass, but still changing in the century or more of our Ontario history, following certain, it seems, fixed laws. Thus at one time Scripture texts abounded and Scripture names, then a period when a verse from a hymn was used, for one of doggerel rhyme composed by a friend, then the stately inscriplion almost in Johnsonese, then ! Mennonite or Quaker graveyards almply name and ago-"merely that and nothing more on low stones not more than a foot in height, apparently expressing humility, but perhaps representing as much pride in their own way as the stately column. Sometimes a pathetic quotation from a real poot, or, again, something original according to individual ideaynerasies. The present fashion avoids the fulsome praise, the elaborate, carefully propor-

lext, and generally gives name, age and birthplace. In the Niegara Peninsula may be found all varieties, often alas in some periocied knot on the farm, which perhaps, has changed owners, and now briard and woods abound or cat tle roam at large. THE SIKH AT HOME

Haco of Warriors. At the present time, when the question of Hindu immigration-is accupying so prominent a place in the consideration of Capadians, it is not united to romark that, outside of India, very little is known by the averago reader of the character, history and religion of the fikles who, of all the races of India, are the most desirable, people to whom the rights and privileges of citizonship in the var-

The Sikha are member of a religious community domiciled in the Punish. the "Land of the Pive Rivers," so famed in Indian history, and all who have no far emigrated come from a district immediately surrounding the city of Labore. Their positions as the most enlightened race in India is largely due to the character of their religion, which in its spiritual influ-

ence, is no wise inferior to Christianity, and, in its lack of ritual and obinscaling ceremony, gains by comparson with the formulity of Occidental churchdom. The founder of this religion was Guru Nanak, who was born in the year 1460, hear Labore. He preached a numetheistic doctrine. maintaining that there was one God and that the true worship of the Doity was to serve one's fellow-man. The name Sikh originated with this first teacher, whose followers were thus called, the term Sikh being Banscrit for disciple. Guru Nanak travas well as in lands outside of India. breaching his gospel of fraternity and humanitarisulam, at a time when the East was surcharged with ritualistic faiths in which spiritual developmont was always subserviout to mere

As the Meslem faithful have their salutation, meaning "there is only one God and Mohammed is His Prophot," so the Hikhs have a greeting which is literally interpreted, "Vto-tory to God, to Whom the Khalsa belongs." Govind Singh gave to all the Sikha the name of Bingh, which means Lion, and the name was well merited, for, in the years that intervened between the passing of this teacher and the establishment of British rule in India, thousands of Sikhs were martyred for their convictions.

The organization of the Khalsa by Govind Bingle so strongthened the Bikha that, after his death, the Punab came into their hands. The king was then Ranjit Singh, 'the Lion of the Punjah." Ranjit Singh was one of the most remarkable of the Hindu rulers with whose lives history makes us familiar. His friendship was courted by the British, whose diplomacy was exerted, at all times, to avoid conflict with the Khalsa. Historians differ in their summing up of the personal qualities, but this much can be with truth; that he was respected and loved by his people, and hat he kept faith with the British. After his death had removed restraint from the Sikhs, they were intrigued into war with the British troops and

lank of England Notes Could Easily Forged, and Yet Are Never. Marco Polo found bank-notes to China ages ago, printed en par er made from the bark of the mulberry tree. One of the notes, upon which the great Venetian traveler fills off may have gazed, is on exhibition at this day in the office of an American company. It is one of a series is ned by the Ming dynasty about 1700 A.D. "current anywhere under heavon"and sooms to have been printed from wooden blocks on a shoot of paper D by 13 inches a bigger surface than any man could cover with both hands outstratched. It is good for "one string of cash."

The provision against forgery ! simple to the point of severity-"Counterfeiters beroof will be executed. Persons giving information of counterfeiters will be rewarded with tacks 250, and in addition, will receive the property belonging to the crim-inal. The head of the Emperor who gave the order and the lopped heads of the comterfeiters have long since mouldered into impalpable dust, the property of the criminal vanished and left not so much as a shade but the faded old hank-note, pressed between sheets of glass and framed in carven teak, still crooks its harsh warning to him who can understand it. The governments of continents Europa depend exclusively upon color-work, to protect their paper curlong list of cures extending back a rency, and several of the large banks of laste have civil engineers in charge of their bureau of engraving and printing - though what connection there may be between engineering and

congraving is a myr'ery, Many Italian bank-notes are easy to counterfeit. The Bank of Spain has of late abandoned its own plant, because its notes were imitated so successfully that counterioits were accepted by the bank without question. A private concern now does the work. The Bank of England notes, accord ing to a myth that probably will never

die, cannot be counterfeited. As a matter of fact, they can be imitated readily enough, for little attempt is made to protect the notes beyond the use of a water-mark paper. The wator-mark can be easily copied. Atsonsitized gelatine film, soaked in cold water, after contact with an original water-mark, will show every detail in clear rollef. A thin film of copper deposited upon this forms the basis upon which a matrix in celluloid made. If a sheet of paper is pasted upon this matrix and rubbed with glass-paper the exact water-mark is

One practical safeguard of great oflectiveness is the custom of the Bank of England to cancel every note that s returned to the bank and laun another in its place. This, and the practice of keeping a record of the numbers of all bank-notes used in every business establishment, keep alive a keen sense of responsibility which adds to security. The custom of circulating soiled bank-notes, o course, gives the counterfelter his best opportunity. Forgery is much more reactily detected in a crisp, stiff, new bill than in a rumpled and dirty one.


