EDITORIAL NOTES

THE BYELECTION in South Renfrew last Thursday Hon. George Graham was re-elected to the House of Commons by a majority of 300. Owing to his position as Minister of Railways and Canals in the Laurier Government Mr. Graham will be a useful member of the House.

HILLS FOR THE PROHIBITION of the shipping of intoxicating liquors into local option territory will be considered by the Congress of the United States on March 4th and a bill agreed upon will be presented to the House on March 10th. Much depends upon the outcome of this measure. Similar action should be taken in Canada. It is, we understand, being prepared for this.

OVER 25,000 HOME TRADE will be thrown open along the line of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway west of Edmonton this year. Of this number 15,000 are in the Grande Prairie section north of Edmonton, the first portion of the famous Peace River country. A branch running south-west from Biggar now under construction will open up a choice section which this section will probably be filled up very quickly.

THE TORONTO STAR says: "By the work of temperance men, a large part of Ontario has been brought under prohibition through local option. If the progress of prohibition under local option will be somewhat slow henceforth, it will be sure. There has been no success so far for the dry cause—mainly dry. They take prohibition not because of the protection afforded by the three-fifths majority law, but because there is an absolute majority against repeal."

THE ELECTRIC ROAD COMING TO ACTON THIS YEAR

Sir Donald Mann's Road to Reach His Native Town in the Fall

FROM TORONTO TO GUELPH

By next fall the Canadian Northern Railway will have an electric line from Guelph to Waterloo, Galt and Galt. This fact was made known by Mr. William Mackenzie, Vice-President and Chief Engineer Wicksteed of the Canadian Northern Railway, to a delegation which visited the local offices of the company on Saturday. The delegation consisted of Mayor Thorp and others from Guelph.
