Milton's Narrow Escape

The investigation of officials at the tunnel station, Guelph, on Monday evening took a Russian from a Grand Trunk train and were preparing to deport him to the States when he grabbed a big automatic pistol and opened fire on the men. He was shot and taken to hospital where he is recovering.

Big Profit From Hydro-Electricity

The Galt papers last week published reports showing results of Hydro-Electric connection in Galt. In fact, the year just closed, Mayor Scott, in submitting the report, said: "This is certainly a most satisfactory showing for the first year's operation of the Hydro-Electric system in Galt. After all operating expenses have been paid a profit of over \$5,000 is shown and in addition to this the obligations to the Ontario Hydro-Electric Commission have been met."

Revenue of 1912

The revenue for 1912 was \$20,000.00 and the cost of current and operating expenses, and interest and sinking fund, \$20,000.00. The contract with the Hydro-Electric Commission was for 1200 h. p. but less than half that amount was used. This shows that Hydro-Electricity is not being used to any extent for power purposes, but another Italian acted as interpreter. The man acknowledged the offence and said they were peace-lovers from Italy, where it was not unlawful to shoot little birds at any season or on any day. They did not know that Ontario laws were different. The magistrate accepted this explanation and let them off easily with a fine of \$2 each and costs, total for the two \$12.00, warning them that a second offence would mean \$20 each. The gun was confiscated and sent to E. Thelby, Superintendent of Game and Fisheries, Toronto. Milton Olympian.
