EDITORIAL NOTES
THE WHEAT CROP OF 1912 will be the greatest ever harvested in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta and will require about fifty thousand farm laborers of the east to mobilize these and assist in harvesting the crop of the world's greatest grainery.

THE JUDGMENT of the Privy Council as was expected, confirms the finding of the Canadian Supreme Court, that the LeComber Bill is unconstitutional and that it would be void if it were to pass. This leaves the power of Parliament. It leaves the conditions of marriage entirely at the direction of the provincial legislatures.

FOLLOWING UP the British press suggestions that some of the British Cabinet Ministers should return the visit of Premier Borden and his colleagues, it has been announced that Canada has extended an invitation to Mr. Hon. Winston Churchill and other Ministers to visit the Dominion next fall when the naval debate is on.

BILLS have been introduced in Congress to reduce letter postage in the United States from two cents to one cent per ounce, and the indications are favorable to such a change being effected. President Taft and Postmaster Hitchcock are in favor of the reduction, and there is little opposition to it from any quarter.

FOLLOWING THE ACTON recently taken by the Provincial Legislature in prohibiting the sale of liquor on dining cars while passing through the State of New Jersey, the Lackawanna Railroad officials last week sent out word that hereafter there will be no liquor sold on the cars of their road in New Jersey.

A MARKETABLE BUSINESS MAN was in Ottawa Sound at the Orange demonstration on the wealth and was heard to remark that he had been in the woods for liquor, one of them an Indian, who said he brought his supply from the Indian Potlucks. Evidence was presented on June 23rd, but judgment was reserved. The Magistrate decided on Saturday that advertising was the same as soliciting orders and therefore a continuation of the act. He imposed a fine of \$50. It is understood that Mr. James Henderson, who acted for the defendants, will enter an appeal.
