TO USE CONCRETE FOR KING

EDWARD ROAD A portion of the King Edward Highway is to be built of concrete. the contract for its construction having been let on September 11th by the Honorable J. R. Caron, Minister of Agriculture and Highways of the Province of Quebec. The King Ed ward Highway is the Canadian section of the International Highway, con necting Montreal with several large cities of the United States. Ultimately, it is expected that this road will continue so far south as Miami

It was the original intention that the eatire highway should be built of macadam; but the Honorable Mini ster, who has under his jurisdiction the Canadian branch of the work, has become interested in concrete road ways and has decided upon this finportant undertaking as a good place to try it out. Governments and munt. evils. sipalities are gradually consing to recognize the necessity of a more per manent form of roadway construction That concrete is the material which best fulfills all the requirements of permanent roadway, is a fact that will ultimately obtain world-wide re-
