EDITORIAL NOTES

GRIECHMONT municipal authorities have notified Hon. Adam Book that arrangements are to be made forthwith to secure a supply of hydro-electric power. This means that male power stations at Port Credit and Guelph will be connected and that a loop will be formed consisting of Port Credit—Brampton—Acton, Milton, Georgetown, and Guelph—Milton Reformer.

THE ONTARIO ALLIANCE OFFICERS have just sent the following information: Another big Local Option meeting will be fought out at the time of the next Municipal Elections in January 1913. Votes is likely to take place in over 70 municipalities, comprising 1 city, 16 towns, 30 villages, and 84 townships. For the most part, the contests are in Western Ontario, Huron leading with nine contests. Among the larger places to vote are Peterborough, Lindsay, Guelph, Clinton, Oshawa, Penetanguishene, Petawawa, and Sarnia. Some of these places have voted before, but in a considerable number the question is before the electors for the first time. The striking feature of the fight, is the fewness of repeat contests. Last year of 178 places where repeat contests were possible, voting took place in 15, and in 10 of these there was the attempt to repeat contests. This year there are 280 possible repeat contests, but it is not likely that in 10 per cent of these, will the issue be brought before the electors.

IS THE LIQUOR PROBLEM undertaken a Local Option repeat contest in Acton they will have on their hands a herculean task; one which is generally considered as foolish and futile. To accomplish their end they must first persuade twenty-five per cent of the qualified electors to sign a public petition asking the Council to submit a by-law for the re-establishing of a licensed liquor traffic in Acton. They may possibly succeed in with the petition. If they do, and the by-law is submitted, the question at the election next January overcomes not only 10 per cent of a majority which the Citizens' Committee succeeded in piling upon the election three years ago, but they must also secure another fifth of all the voters after the above majority is wiped out, to comply with the three-fifths requirement of the Act. It is truly a few of those who were credited with voting favorably to Local Option at last election who are now alleged to be prepared to vote against it. On the other hand the Citizens' Committee have the names of a number who opposed the measure then who are now quite convinced that both moral and material benefits will follow the adoption of Local Option and will do their best against any change. There is no doubt whatever that if the local forces who are prepared to fight the notorious evils of a licensed liquor traffic will work as strenuously in their behalf as in a repeat contest, as they did before—and it is confidently believed they will—Local Option will be sustained in Acton by a large majority.
