The electric railway construction gang has done a great deal of blasting on the Harvey farm this past week.

Surveyors for the new Canadian Northern Electric line have been at work in the vicinity of the tanneries this week.

A New Hospital at Orangeville. The new Lord Dufferin Hospital was opened at Orangeville the first of the month. About five years ago the Orangeville Chapter of the Daughters of the Empire was formed, when the idea of establishing a hospital was undertaken.

About \$7,000 was raised by subscription, and a large residence was purchased and entirely remodelled, special attention being given to the heating and plumbing. Sixty beds are already installed.

Postoffice Meeting. The farmers generally complain about the potato crop. They say the potatoes seem to be all right when they are dug, but in a few days they begin to show signs of rot and many have to be thrown away especially those that have been grown in very low land.

As a consequence the city folks are afraid to buy their winter supply of potatoes, for fear they will get a lot of bad ones. They were ranging from 90 cents to \$1.00 before Saturday's market.—Guelph Herald.

The deceased was born in Saskatchewan, England, seven years ago, and after living four years in Acton went west to Percy, Moose Mountain, three years ago. Her husband pre-deceased her six years. Win Fair Successful as Usual. The last of the Fall Fair of this section in Erin last Friday, was a great success. The entries were numerous and creditable and the attendance was \$3,000.

The show itself was perhaps the best all round show ever given in Erin. True, some departments were short of their usual number of entries, but those were made up in the other departments. There were over 3,800 entries altogether, which is a record for the fair.

The visitors included almost the entire countryside. Many came from Toronto. Every available stall in Acton was put into commission. The weather was fine till about five o'clock but many were drenched with the rain on their homeward trip.

A Pretty Home Wedding. A pretty home wedding was celebrated last Friday at the residence of the bride's parents in Dundas when Mr. Charles H. Moore, Manager and Secretary of the Dundas Star Printing Co., eldest son of Mr. James Moore, of River Avenue, Acton, was joined in the bonds of holy wedlock to Miss Jessie Potter, B. A., daughter of Rev. Austin Potter, of Dundas. The ceremony was performed by the father of the bride, assisted by Rev. A. E. Birks, B. L. L. E. and was attended by the immediate friends of the contracting parties. Mr. and Mrs. Moore left by the evening train on a two weeks' honeymoon tour to the Pacific Coast, Chicago, St. Louis, St. Paul, Denver, and other points.

A New Coal and Bank Trade. Preparations are being made for the erection of a new coal and bank trade at the works of the Acton Tanning Co., which will greatly facilitate the handling of the commodities which are used so extensively. The structure will be built to connect with a switch on the new siding at the foot of Egin Street and will be carried over the roof of the bank-mills buildings and the boiler house. Cans of bark will be dumped direct into the bark mills and coal to the fire holes. Structural iron on top of the building will also have a canopy of new heavy timbers. The new building will eliminate the necessity for a large amount of teaming and handling of the two commodities.
