The electors of Georgetown will vote on the Hydro-Electricity by-law next Monday. The fine weather is much appreciated by the builders with outside work not completed. It has been decided to defer submitting a Local Option by-law at Hamilton this year. Mr. C. J. Staret has sold his farm at lot 37, con. 10, Requeing, to Mr. J. McNeill, of Terra Cotta. Rev. J. W. H. Milne, of Ottawa, formerly of Boston Church, Requeing, has accepted a call to Weston. Arrangements are in fine shape for St. Alban's Church Bazaar on Friday and Saturday, 22nd and 23rd inst. A series of special services will be held in St. Alban's Church, Requeing, Nov. 19th to 23rd, inclusive. Mr. C. Symon, pastry cook, has removed from Mill Street to the Pearson Store in the rear of Henderson & Co's. The flour and feed stores on Willow Street are being brightened up. A new plate glass front is among the improvements. At the last meeting of the County Council Mr. J. G. Wilson, road superintendent, was giving an increase of \$500 in salary. Mr. Chester McNeil, lot 36, con. 5, Neenagawa, has a goose that has laid sixteen eggs already this fall and is still laying. Mr. W. Digby, collector of the St. John's Society, delivered an interesting address at the Methodist Sunday School on Sunday afternoon.
