It is spoiled its coming in contact with air. Therefore the allo should not be of too great diameter. Not more than eight square feet should be allowed for carl cow to be fed in winter. When feet ing forty pounds of sliege per row tayer about one and a balf laches deep will be fed off daily. When ferding in summer it is advisable that the exposed area be not over buil this sixe. so that a layer three luches deep may be used daily. No sile should be larger than twenty to twenty-two feet in diameter, because distance from the door increases labor of removal To be well proportioned the beight of a allo should not be more than twice the diameter. No allo should be less than thirty feet deep, and to get suffi cient depth for a allo not over twelve

feet in diameter it may be placed four or five feet in the ground. Silage will usually be needed about 200 days, or from about Oct. 20 to May 10. If we have a berd of thirty cows to which we wish to feed sliage for 200 days it will not, as a rule, be well to feed over forty pounds of silase daily per beed - If this quantity. be fed 100 tone of silage will be required, for which 110 tons of corn fod der must be placed in the silo. Taking forty pounds as the average weight of a cubic foot of corn silars. each ton of sliero will therefore take up fifty cubic feet and 100 tous 5.000

Shelter For Hogs When bogs are turned out to peature in the spring or fall they need some kind of protection from the weather and a shed, such as is shown in the accompanying illustration, is very convenient, therefore, to bave, says the American Cultivator. It can be made any size desired, but if only about six feet wide, five feet long and four feet high it can be more easily handled than if larger. 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

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
