IS IT ANY WONDER that the cost of living is high on the continent "Major-General Leonard Wood, Ohiel of Staff of the United States army while discussing the unpreparedness of his country for war, said that the people of the United States speci more money last year for automobils tires than was appropriated for the navy, and that the salaries of chanffeure amounted to more than was expended on the army."

WITH THE GENERAL REVISION of the railway act, to be introduced in the Commons this session by the Minister of Railways, clauses will be inserted meeting the request of the Union of Canadian Municipalities for amendments of existing legislation to as to make it clear that the Railway Commission has jurisdiction over al Federally incorporated power transmission and telegraph and telephone companies, and also securing to municipalities the right of control over their own streets.

THE GENEROUS MEASURE of public aid to railway construction in Canada is shown by the fant that the total Federal, Provincial and Municipal oush aid now totals over #208,000,000 while land grants total over 55,000,000 acres. Federal and Provincial bond guaranters aggregate \$345,070,045, of which the Dominion's share is \$91. 983,553. Alberta has pledged its credit to the extent of \$45,489,000: British Columbia, \$38,945,832; Sas katchewan, \$32,500,000; Manitoba. \$20,890,000, and Ontario, \$7,800,000.

INDIVIDUAL ORITICISM of local affaire je likely to be narrow, selfish Ill-considered and destructive.
