The Foreigner's Night School.

The night school for the instruction of the foreigners in the English language, conducted by the church in town for several months, with Mr. Charles L. Innes, has been discontinued for the present. While we have still a considerable population of foreigners, many of them having been here for a few weeks and others who were here during the summer and have removed. They appear to be restless and desirous of change of scene. It is said they rarely remain in a place permanently. The House of Justice.

The annual report of the Peel-Halton House of Refuge gives the average number of inmates from Peel county as twenty and from Halton thirteen. Each inmate costs \$120.00 per annum for maintenance or \$25.00 per week. The total receipts for the year amounted to \$3,900.44. The sum paid in salaries for the year is \$1,795, for supplies \$1,200.22, for insurance, light and heat \$1,222.12, and for the miscellaneous matters \$203.47. There were 18 inmates in the house from Halton and 29 from Peel last year. The net cost of the House of Refuge to Peel and Halton County Councils is \$3,551.

Action's Biggest Chopper.

Bill Hug, H. P. Caldwell, got his new 50 h.p. motor at the chopper mill running on Saturday. He has since been turning out the chopped and rolled feed with much satisfaction. The motor is speeded considerably higher than was the old steam engine and much better work is the result. Both the chopped feed and rolled oats are highly spoken of by the farmers. Mr. Caldwell deserves much credit for his enterprise and he will no doubt receive the patronage of the farmers from a wide area, and all possible encouragement from our business men. Mr. D.
