Whenever the time comes when you can no longer use the pure bred aire to advantage in your herd start out in search of another, and before leaving home make another close examination of your best cows and find out what variations have taken place and what type of a buil is peeded to carry out your ideas of further improvement discarded buil and preferably one bred slong the same lines. By strictly adbering to this rule you will gradually be able to grade up your hard and not crossbreed, as is practiced by a targe

number of dairymen. Upgrading is gradually bringing the herd up to the standard of pure bred cattle, while crombreeding as commonly practiced means nothing more then leaving some established road and driving off into the wilderness. Grade cows will long continue to be at the head of the flat as dairy producers. Thus there must be a rigid weeding out of inferior cows, and great care

Hoge Need Abundant Water. In most places water doesn't cost anything. It is just as important to making a fat hog, however, as corn or alfairs. Its cheapness has led us many times to overlook its value. The bog is a big thick bunch of fat and lean. He rots hot easily. He needs water to keen his body cool to keen, his blood hin, to aid in directing his food and

to prevent constinution. If corn came down from the sky looking at the two would be reversed. if we can let our imaginations carry us that far we will realize more fully

the value of water. A good supply of pure water to plendid disease preventive. If the bogs are required to quench their thirst insufficiently in a mudhole their chance of secaping disease is on the face of it not as good as though they had free access to a liberat, unpolluted supply of fresh water. Experially during the bot summer months give want, because it is besithful, econom kal and pecessary.
