Real Use of the Bouls Sting. "The bee's sting to a trowel, not a

"spier." said a nature student. "It is an exquisitely delicate little trowel with which the bee finishes off the bonky cell, injects a little preservative inside and seeks it up. With its trowel-like sting the bee puts the final touches on the dainty and mondorful work. With the sting it puts and shapes the boney cell, as a mason pats and shapes a row of brick. Before seating up the cell it drops a wee bit of poison into the honey. This is formic acid. Without it honey would spell. Most of us think the bee's eting, with its polson, is a weapon only. It is a weapon secondarily, but primarily it is a magic trowel, a trowel from whose end, as the honey calls are

Destroying Money, Paper money is nothing but a promstroy a five dollar pole, for instance, you simply release the government or the bank which imped the note from the payment of the \$5 in gold which fore, you are not punishable in any manner for destroying the note if it is your own. There is no penalty for mutitating gold or silver coin if you keep it in your own possession, but as you have thereby destroyed a considerable part of its value you must not try to pass it at par after the mutilation.

Flame and Wire Gaura To Bir Humphry Davy belongs the credit of discovering that the fiame of burning gas will not pass through wire gause having 784 meshes to the square inch. This contention may be technic by bringing a fiame to contact with similar gause, when it will be found that the flame will not go through the meshes. This is owing to the cooling action of the wire, which tends to reduce the temperature of the fame below the ignition point, the unburned gas passing barmlessly through. Of course if the gause becomes overbested the flame is able to get through.
