Dairy Prepetency.

Improving a milking berd through the influence of the dam pover will be sitained. Delry prepotency can neither be maintained nor advanced in that way. This idea rules out dairy bred sires from the start and makes breeding a matter of grades that adds to the confusion as greater assortments of bloods (f) are commingled. The improvement must come from the side of the sire, an animal that has in bim the lines of a great number of high producing ancestors. Of course a good mother is to be desired, but she is a good mother because of the lined heredity of the sire. She can bequesth nothing to the next generation in the way of betterment except she is aided by the concentrated heredly of a sire of dairy descent. 
