Borden has given assur acce of his intention to personally intoroduce a measure of prohibition as has agreed to second the bill to ! introduced by the Premier. It may not, however, come this session.

THE OUTLOOK for every phase business in Western Canada is opti mistic, because of the excellent prospects for their chief source of wealth the wheat crops. In a little over two months barvesting will begin and the critical month of April has passed with scarcely a word from bullia interests. In Canada seeding has been practically completed under favorable conditions, and business is already responding, even in luxuries.

THE new Ontario Marriage Act is now in force. An important provision le that to obtain a license in a localit where peither of the parties has reald ed for at least fifteen days a notice o application must be inserted in a local paper once a week for three weeks. The object of this regulation is to prerent sudden and secret .marriages at border towns. Another section provides a penalty of \$500 for a clergyman who is guilty of uniting parties mentally defective or under the infinence of Houor.




