PARIS STREET ACTORS

There is no other city in the world where the theatre plays so large a part in life as it does in Paris. That city has always supplied a kind of "parade" opera and has produced in a young and merry mood that delights either philosopher or pleasure lover. But long before even pleasure gardens came into existence in France about the only amusement known to the poorer classes was applied by street actors, who performed, as now, for as much coin of the realm as they could get.

In those days the streets were very narrow; very dirty, and most of them had not even an apology for a sidewalk. When a vehicle stopped for any reason everything behind it was obliged to stop, too. The Seine frequently flooded the thoroughfares, making street mud that was liable to indelible ink. It was next to impossible to remove it from shoes of any material. The street actors appeared in the middle of the seventeenth century, but their art has been handed down to us almost unchanged.

Many of these figures in the medieval history of Paris, appearing on crude wooden platforms, sometimes decorated by instruments—that were also crude. They like to perform on the famous stone quays of the city where there was no room than in the congested streets. The Pont Neuf, which bridge over the river—its railing is a masterpiece of sculpture—was a favorite place. On the island was a statue of Henry IV. Outside its railing were small stalls containing various articles for sale. Opposite these were the shaven men.

Jean Salomon, who appeared under the name of "Tabarin," was the most famous actor of that day. He gave the dictionary of his own words. It is said: "Merry andrew, a buffoon. Will be a good name for a young actor called Mentor. Tabarin gave impromptu monologues while Monsieur de la Roche, a philosopher, was every known disease. This is said to have been analysed and found to have been a simple case of the disease of a few drops of water.

In the 18th century the type of Tabarin was replaced by rilly-deux-matras. Some carried trained animals to attract the crowd; others carried a large number of small dolls and puppets. Light-roped walkers, dancers and marionettes were popular with a lighted candle inside. An ingenious mechanical novelty was a puppet which a spectator could see and lay upon a table. It would snap its trigger at any moment previously decided upon and was almost as popular as the thought-reading automaton. Another automaton was in the form of a dove with a wheel on her head. Given a coin, she would raise a glass to the bird's beak, which she would then drink. There was also a mechanical grocer who stood behind his counter and served the customer. Many other mechanical toys and ingenious tricks, kept the early Parisian well amused.
