

ANSWERING A CALL

How a Labrador Doctor Want to the Missionary's Air

An urgent call in Labrador means not only inconvenience and hardship to the doctor and his sledge-drive. but actual danger. Nevertheless, ter one over flinches from his duty. Dr. G. K. Hutton, in "Among the Eskimos of Labrador." tells of one such call. On a bitterly cold and stormy night came the message from the missionary at Hebron, seventy-one miles away, "Come, my people are dying." It was an urgent call, and there must he no delay. Quickly the dogs were harpened to the sledge, the Eskimo. drivers were in place; everything was

"It was pitch; black when we startd. A raw air came meaning from the seat; it chilled as through our sealskins, and made our cheeks and noses sche. When I tried to warm my stiffeeth toes by an occasional trot alegacide the sledge, I kept stumbling over Pleged points of ice, until one of the men shouted, 'Sit', or we shall be losing you!

"After that I sat still and hoped for morning. For two solid hours the agony went on, and then a faint dimmer of grey began to show in the east; it changed to a dull red, sullen and lurid in the morning haze, and we began to see the wide stretch of white ice beside us, and a black and awful see ahead of us. "Then we stopped our sledge and clustered together to consult about finding a road to Hebron.


