### KILLED BY A TRAIN AT MOFFAT

Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Donovan Killed Near Their Own Home

### GY. P. R. TRAIN AT CROSSING

Mr. and Mrs. John Henry Donovan, of Moffat, were the victims of a terrible fatal crossing railway accident at Moffat on Saturday morning, within a few rods of their residence, near the G. P. R. station. They had been picking berries in a patch near Campbellville and were returning home when the fatality occurred. They appeared to have seen the approaching train and turned the horse toward the station yards, but he appeared to balk at the crossing, reaching it just as the train came upon them. Mrs. Donovan was thrown on the grass at the side of the road, while Mr. Donovan was thrown about twenty feet against a willow. He was frightfully mangled, his death being instantaneous. Mrs. Donovan died at midnight.

Mr. Donovan was a native of the town of New York, where he was born about thirty-five years ago. They are survived by five children, two sons and three daughters. The sons are Charles Wesley, on the old homestead, and Henry Whitfield at Guelph. The daughters are Mrs. Theo. Wilson, Killarney; Mrs. Walter Turnbull, Campbellville, and Mrs. Geo. Guelph, of Guelph. One brother also survives, Thomas, of Kerwin, Kansas. The double funeral on Monday, at the Methodist Cemetery at Moffat, was one of the largest ever held in the township.
