to \$38,906,827, against \$35,251,028 i

1912. For July the revenue had an in

crease of \$317,490 over July 1912. CANADA WAN the largest to automobiles and automobile parts from the United States last year. This country bought 7,200 care in the year valued at \$0,200,000. England bought 4,000 care from the States valued at \$3,000,000. This gives a good idea of where a large portion of the money of the country is locked up.

AN AMENUMENT to the regulations regarding the importation of live stock to Canada states that no animal imported for the improvement of stock shall come in duty free unless the owner or owners be liritish subjects. resident within the Kapire. The salmal must be recorded in a Canadian National record, or, in the event of there being no record for that particu lar breed, to a foreign record of recognized standing in Canada.

AT NEXT MEETING of the County Council a petition from the business men of all the towns and villages of the county will be presented. 
