Camaron, John Charlton and William Paterson. Mr. Blake went briefly over the main features of the hill, indicating what line he proposed to take in opening the debate and assigning to each of us certain phases of the question so as to cover fully the whole bill. We went to work on our respective assignments as directed, with the intention of not encroaching on the ground which Mr. Blake had reserved for himself or which he had assigned to each of us. As a leader he was patient with both friends and foes. If time was wanted for a full discussion of any measure, he was always ready to make his personal convenience a secondary mat-ter. . 




