EIGHT CHARGES STILL PENDING It was like Local Option times at the own hall on Tuesday. The trial of violators of the Liquor Laws attracted crowds to the Magistrates' Court than. There were just as large crowds to bear the evidence in the whiskey cases up this necession under the segime the licensed bar rooms. The same law obtains now se far as unlicensed sell ing is concerned, as did then, and the

penalties are al severe.

Magistrates H. P. Moore and A. E. Nicklin were on the Bench. The first case heard was a charge against Morris Saze for selling liquor on the 20 h of August. On that casion Adolph Hansen, Superintendent of construction of the Toronto Subseban Railway, under the contract of J I. Hoyd, purchased two bottles

Hiram Walker's Baronial whiskey, for which he paid the defendant \$2.00 The money was supplied by Govern ment officers, and the whicker was delivered by Hausen to the officers. It was produced in court. A convicttion was made and a penalty of \$200

and costs imposed. The second case against Morris Saxs was for selling a bottle of liquor to Hansen on the 26th August. This whiskey was also produced in court but there was conflicting evidence as to dates and the magistrates gave the defendant the benefit of the doubt and dismissed the charge.

The Provincial Impector sented evidence against Mr. Haze, charging him with keeping liquor for sale. A quantity of liquor seized by Inspector Ayearst and his officers on the 6th September in his house was produced. It was the same brand as that previously put in. Evidence of sales during the previous thirty days was adduced, and the magistrates registered another conviction with a penality of \$150 and costs...

The only other case which came up at this sitting was a charge against Joss Bridge for keeping liquor for sale. When the officers raided Bridge's place on the 6th September five cases of peer and some other liquors were

Before Bridge could be served wit a summons to appear to answer to the charge be skipped out of town. By some clever detective work Chief Lawson located him with a construction gang near Madoc. He secured warrant for his arrest, proceeded to Madoe by the sarty morning train anded his man and had him in the cells at eleven o'clock on Tuesday. When charged with the offense of un lawfully keeping liquor for sale Bridge pleaded guilty. The magistrates imposed a penalty of \$100 and costs or three months in goal. Not having the amount of of the penalty he was committed to the county jail at hard

labor. Three charges for selling liquo at different dates still stand against the prisoner.




