A FAMILY OF PIE EATERS

A very busy woman is Mrs. John Walters, of Blair County, Pennsylvania, who has every reason to believe that she holds the pie-baking record, at least in her state. GOATS PLAYED ALIVE.

Great Tortures inflicted on Animals in Many Parts of India. In an illustrated pamphlet issued by the Anti-Vivisection Society of England attention is drawn to the Indian practice of playing live goats. This commercial barbarity is prevalent throughout India and is done in order to obtain local measurements for the market, so called 'goat necks' commanding a higher price on account of the size and length. The dreadful process is carried out by fastening the living goat and working down the neck, after which the throat is cut. In one of these cases, which came under the notice of the Hon. Mrs. Charlton, the goat was fastened to a cart, and the animal, though rescued from its tormentors, finally succumbed to injury to the spine he had sustained. The act of torture was performed under the eye in the shape of a cut in the form of a St. Andrew's cross, and the skin, torn away in flaps, fell to the ground. The practice of branding domestic animals for commercial purposes and cutting the ears and nostrils of dogs is prevalent in many parts of India. These cruelties result in much suffering, though they are atrociously punished by the poorer classes. It is a matter to be regretted that the attention to convey some benefit to the animal.

Direct or Alternating Currents.

If the current is alternating the filament will vibrate. The part inside the lamp from which the light emanates will vibrate; if the current is direct, the filament will be attracted or repelled, as the positive or the negative pole of the magnet is held near the lamp.—New York Sun.
