EVERYWHERE IN CANADA, as in every country in Christendom, the general tendency is to curb the distillation of liquor.

THE TOTAL EMIGRATION TO CANADA during the first seven months, April to October of the current fiscal year, was 207,013, made up of 128,988 British, 62,220 American and 135,805 from all other countries.

AN IMPORTANT ANNOUNCEMENT has just been made by the Dominion Immigration Department at Ottawa, in which a restriction of the Immigration Act is declared for the time intervening between now and March 1st.
