EDITORIAL NOTES
THE GOVERNMENT OF Saskatchewan announced that the grain harvest of this year will be valued at \$110,000,000, of which \$71,000,000 is represented in wheat, and \$39,000,000 in oats.

TWENTY-FIVE freight boats left Fort William on Monday morning with 400,000 bushels of grain from the Northwest. November was a record month for the shipment of grain from the harbor during the last week. More than eighty vessels with something like fifty million bushels of grain have come east.

THE THOMAS BRIDGEMAN, President of the Canadian Pacific Railway, in an interview on the financial situation said: "The amount of the flow of money into Canada has been beneficial in that it has induced on Canadians that careful and economical handling of money in business and in private affairs which has been the real secret of Canada's past prosperity."

IN THE WESTERN PROVINCES there is to be seen a beginning in the same well-tendency to overcrowd the cities at the expense of the country that is so strongly in evidence in older Canada. In Alberta, where less than 10 per cent of the area of the province was occupied as farms lands in 1910, nearly 30 per cent of the population was living in villages, towns and cities. The proportion of urban dwellers shows a steady increase. In 1901 only 23.34 per cent of the population was urban, in 1906 33 per cent, were town dwellers, and in 1910 the proportion was 37.88 per cent.

DR. GRAY'S DRIVER SACRIFICED
To Save the Little Children of Rev. H. H. Wilkinson
WHEN SCARED BY AN AUTO
On Saturday morning at Dr. Gray was driving up Main street to visit a patient in the country he met a motor delivery car, driven by Mr. Fleming, a merchant of Guelph. The horse, which was a young one, was frightened by the motor. The driver kept a firm rein and succeeded in passing the auto, when the horse suddenly bolted to the right and directly in the course of the residence of Rev. H. H. Wilkinson, rector of St. Alban's Church, with the two little children of the home, were on the walk. A few feet away stood one of the Hyden transmission poles. Dr. Gray saw at once if the horse were allowed to proceed to the pavement the children would be killed. Without hesitation he put his whole weight on the reins and swerved the frightened animal straight for the electric pole. The impact was tremendous, so great indeed, that the horse's back was broken. Dr. Gray miraculously escaped without any serious injury.

DR. LAWSON and Constable Harvey despatched the injured animal and had the carcass conveyed to a burial place beyond the corporation limits.
