Halton County's Vital Statistics The anunal report of births marriagse and deaths in this province for the year 1912 has just been baued. During the year there were in Ontario 58,870 registrations of births, ZLHI5 marriages and 32,150 deaths. Of the marriages 81 grooms and 13 bridge were 70 years of age or over. Nearly

half of the marriages were of persons between 20 and 21 years of age. Of the deaths 2,720 were caused by organic heart diseases and 2,250 by tuberque look. In Halton County there were 420 births, 204 buys and 216 girls. Four pairs of twins were registered. It is very creditable that is this county last year there were only five illegiti mate births. Halton had 100 marriagse last year, 31 of which were in June During the year we had 220 deaths Of these 106 were males and 123 females: 161 were Canadians, 47 for eigners and 21 not stated.
