AN ADVANCE in the price of leather, was predicted at a meeting of Toronto tanners recently. They claim that although the output of the United States is still a scarcity of hides, which is the chief cause of the advance. As a remedy it is suggested that the Government prohibit the killing of female cattle under five or six years old.

They have done their work well and we now have a school well adapted to present and future requirements and which every citizen will feel a pride in. It is in the interest of the town to have Messrs. Spaight, Kenney, Kennedy, Forbes, Johnstone and Scott, should continue their work together undisturbed for another year.
