MASTERLY SERMONS BY DR. LAW
At the Anniversary Services in Knox Church last Sunday
CONGREGATION'S WIDE LAUD
Powerful yet wifid simple and easily understood, were the sermons last Sunday at Knox Church anniversary by Rev. Prof. Law, Knox College. Both discourses were fervent in spirit and emphasized the gospel message in a manner which every hearer could appreciate. In a long list of successive anniversary occasions, Knox has been honored with many eloquent and cultured speakers, but had not quite the opinion that no speaker of them all ever touched the hearts of the congregation more deeply than did Dr. Law last Sunday.

In the morning his subject was personal service and the sermon was based upon Acts 13:36, "For David, after he had served his own generation, by the will of God, fell asleep." This, he said, was the Apostle's epitaph for the kinglist of Israel's ancient kings, and it shows how deeply Paul was moved with the spirit of David, and how it moved him to have the old man go to another church. He had the dead king with all his magnificence of achievement. First, as one who served. So the first great thought here is that the true ideal of life is service. Life; this everyday possession of time, thought, faculty, opportunity has a meaning; and in God's meaning it is a power for service, an obligation to service. It is not a circle returning perpetually upon itself. Its true end lies beyond itself. This is universal truth, written everywhere upon the face of creation. Even in the material world nothing exists for itself alone. But above all else the law of service is written on the revelation of God in Christ. If the great interment was made at Fairview Cemetery, Acton, the pallbearers were John Mottram, Thomas H. Storey, James George Blacklock, Cecil Atkins and John Black.
