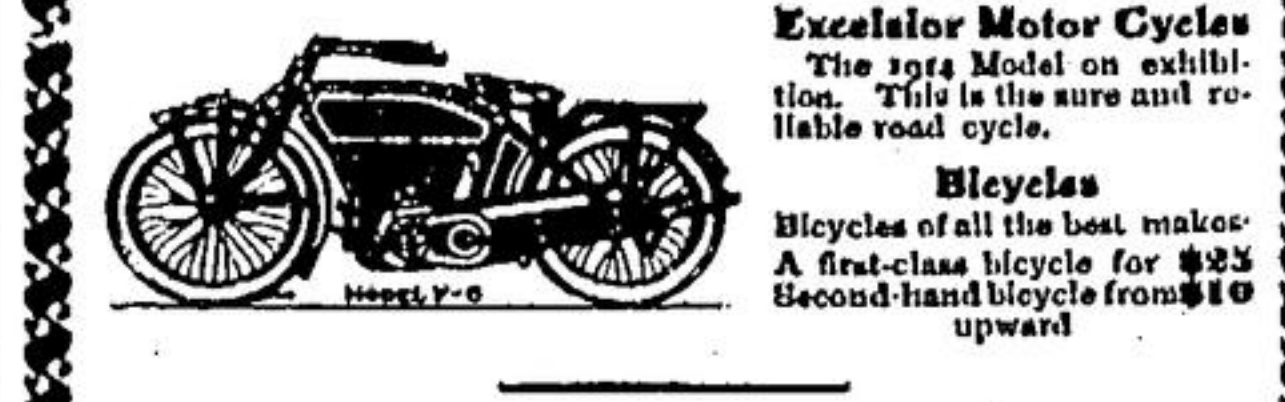

At a meeting of the Board of Health Commissioners held in Georgetown last week it was decided, in view of the recent majority in favor of the Canada Temperance Act, to issue no new licenses. The present licenses will be extended for three months from May 1st in order to give the hotelkeepers an opportunity to dispose of their stocks. This will also apply to clubs and shops, so that after July 1st liquor can legally be sold in Peel County. This will place the county for the next year under the liquor license act, so far as an enforcement of the law goes, and after May 1st, 1915, the Canada Temperance Act will govern.
