Allied Armies Have Lost Very Heavily

In Big Battle With German Troops—Fate of France Hangs On Battle in Progress

BRITISH LOST 2,000 BUT ARE WONDERFULLY COOL

The past few days have been fatal at the seat of war. The Germans occupied Brussels last Friday without opposition, the Belgian forces having been centred at Antwerp to protect the temporary Capital. The fortress of Namur was taken on Sunday in a great battle between the Allies and Germany.

The admittance by the War Office that Namur has fallen has ended all hope in England for a speedy conclusion of the war.

It is now accepted that England will be compelled to send every available man, both from the British Isles and the colonies if the German invasion of France is to be checked. It is believed that additional troops are already being sent forward as transports were being fitted out for service yesterday.

All of London and the leading financial papers are demanding that the Government explain the fall of Namur. It is admitted that the British casualties to date are enormous, although no statement of the exact number is forthcoming. The total losses in both armies are not yet known, but the official say that when the figures are actually revealed they will "stun the world."

A new battle is in progress between Maubeuge and Douai. On hangs the fate of France. Operations in Alsace along the Rhine would take away troops which might defend victory. It is necessary that they all withdraw from Alsace temporarily, in order to insure its final deliverance. It is a matter oflund necessity.

The French press gives much space to the Russian victories in eastern Prussia. They won a great victory at Tannenburg in Prussia. The Russians have crushed the old army left on the eastern frontier, which is now partly annihilated and partly cut off from retreat.

There is strong probability of a lengthy war, but the great battles now in progress will vital results.

OBITUARY

MICHAEL KALEY

The death of Michael Kaley occurred on Wednesday, August 14th, in his 53rd year. Mr. Kaley was born in Ireland in the town of Minagh, in the county of Tipperary and came to Canada in the year 1857. He resided in Lot 21, 2nd line, Esquerring, for 28 years. In religion he was a Roman Catholic and a faithful member of St. Joseph's Church, Acton. He died at his home well fortified by the last rites of his church. Before a large assembly of friends the funeral took place on Friday at 3:30 and proceeded to St. Joseph's Church, where the requiem High Mass was said. The services were conducted by Rev. Fr. J. J. O'Farrell, the pastor of the parish. The cortage proceeded to the R. C. Cemetery, Dublin. Mr. Kaley was predeceased by his wife some nine years ago. His children followed their mother, of whom three have died, Anna, Phillip, and John. Three sons and three daughters remain: James E., and Joseph H. of Acton; Michael, on the homestead; Mrs. J. McFally, of Glanwillow; Margaret and Elizabeth at home. He also leaves a brother, James, in Yoronto. The pall bearers at the funeral were James Stewart, D. Wallace, D. McNaughton, James Gibbons, Martin Kelly, and M. Kaley.




