EDITORIAL NOTES

The Great Majority of Free Press subscriptions expire in December. Prompt notices are being sent out this week, and will ensure the uninterrupted receiving of your home paper every week.

LOUPTON contest will be fought next January in three towns, seven incorporated villages and nine townships. Licence reduction campaign, are being carried on in Hamilton and London.

The Values of the Act passed by the Ontario Legislature, imposing an ad valorem tax on life insurance companies, is to be tested in the courts. The companies had that said tax to other provinces and the Provincial Treasurer that they decline to pay the same.

A letter received from the Colonial Secretary, to the Government at Ottawa states that all presents to individual soldiers, or to bodies of men belonging to the Canadian expeditionary force, will be admitted into Great Britain free of duty.

The Postmaster throughout the country is growing more popular and general every week to re-elect Municipal Councils and Boards of Education, this year year by acclamation, thus saving the expense of an election. This method will apply very well to Acton. This is no crying need for a change in either Board.

PARSONS HURST has announced that the Hamilton Government proposes, through inviting co-operation from license holders, to issue an order-in-Council to secure the closing of bars and clubs at seven p.m. and wholesale places at six during the war. This is a good example for Premier Hurst of Ontario.

REVEREND to the late Field Marshal Earl Roberts the Nashville, Tenn. Advertiser pays this tribute: "He was a great soldier, a man of simple faith and of deep religious feeling, always preached temperance to his soldiers, and never used an oath. The British soldiers followed loyally the chief of their faith and affectionately named 'Bob'."

THE BRAMPTON HANOVER reports that Speaker Brown of the House of Commons is about to resign and that R. Blain, M. P., Brampton, is likely to be his successor. Mr. Blain would grace the speaker's chair, both by his courteous demeanor and his fine personality. His long experience in the House amply fits him for the responsible position.

IT IS MANY years since a German government consultation reported that beer and whiskey were the greatest enemy of the nation and the German Emperor has, for some time, been warning his troops that the great battle of the future would be won by the soberest nation. In this present war Russia, Germany and Norway have prohibited the manufacture and sale of intoxicants and England and France have curtailed their use to a considerable extent. Lord Kitchener forbade even presents of wine being sent to the soldiers and Lord Roberts pleaded with the people not to treat soldiers to intoxicants. What is Canada going to do about this enemy that is destroying the nation? Are our roles so casted of the liquor traffic that they will let it go on its murderous course unbridled? Will they let it go on weakening the vitality of our young men till it will be easy for a sober people to seize and make slaves of our children?

CANADA TO SEND 96,000 MEN

The Third Overseas Contingent is to Number Thirty-two Thousand Troops

ALLIED NOW ON THE OFFENSIVE

The distribution of the additional force which is to be sent for active service in the third contingent has been announced subject to possible revision, and the plans show an equal number of men to be raised in the east and in the west. While the west will raise five cavalry regiments to four in the east, it will only raise nine infantry regiments as against ten in the east.

The extra force will total 31,700 in proportion to population the west will be contributing a much larger share than the east. When these forces are all recruited the total strength will be 53,000 in England, 8,000 on guard duty, 23,000 raised to date for second force. Total in active service now, 61,000. The 31,700 men about to be raised will bring the grand total up to 92,700. With superannuation the force will total 110,000.

The forces about to be raised will include five cavalry regiments of 5,000 men, 10 infantry regiments of 20,000 men; army service corps, 2000 men; army medical corps, 1500 men; six batteries of artillery, 1200 men; engineers, 1000; signal and cycle corps, 200 men.

During the week the Germans have been almost continually on the offensive. The Allies, both in the west and in the east, are holding their own and in many cases advancing. This is especially true with the Russian forces.

The impression grows daily that Germany is at last reduced to a hopeless war of defence. It becomes every day more clear that the moral incentives are beginning to tell. The judgment of the world has turned against Germany, and at her door the world lays its miseries. Strongest of all to touch the imperialist's heart is the moral effect of the death and wounding of a fourth or more of the able-bodied men of the nation.

COLUMBIA ORAVONOLAS

The demand for Columbia Grafonolas and Columbia records is advancing with remarkable strides. They are growing in favor everywhere. The Columbia factory received this week the following telegrams from the Music Supply Co., Toronto: "Completely sold out of 874 Patricia Grafonolas, and other records are running short also. You must make big shipments at once, or they will have to call their travellers off the road, and reduce advertising."

THE G. T. R. PAYS DAMAGES

For Death of Robert Wright and Injuries to Miss Hossey at 7th Line Crossing

AND HOSPITAL EXPENSES, ETC.

The fatal accident at the seventh line crossing on the Grand Trunk Railway on the 7th of February last is remembered with much sorrow. The accident resulted in the death of Robert H. Wright, a farmer residing on the seventh line, Kanesburg, and serious injuries to Mildred Hossey, daughter of John W. Hossey, a farmer who lives not far from Georgetown.

Mildred Hossey was taken to the Guelph General Hospital, and underwent treatment for several months. She had sustained a fracture of the right thigh, and was otherwise injured.

Robert Wright died while being taken to the hospital. An inquest on his body was held in Guelph before Coroner Savage. Mrs. Wright, widow of the deceased, and Mr. Hossey, father of Mildred Hossey, placed their case against the Grand Trunk Railway Company in the hand of Messrs. Guthrie, Guthrie and Kerwin. Both claims have now been settled by the railway company paying substantial sums for damages to the widow of Mr. Wright, and to Mr. and Mrs. Hossey for Mildred Hossey, besides paying all hospital and other expenses.
