Editor Free Press: Dear Sir: Please find enclosed \$1.00 for one year's subscription.

We had Mr. W. H. North, B. S., the son of Mr. North, the former mayor of Geoply, and his party, during some survey work in the Nicola Valley, and they stayed in Geoply for two months.

We had quite a chat concerning the old town of Acton and its surroundings. On looking back, after journeying from Montreal to Vancouver and all through these western provinces, I have come to the conclusion I have never been in a prettier town for its size, than the town of Acton.

I am delighted to see the town is progressing, with the addition of the new house for Postmaster Matthews in the Post Office, which is another elegant building for the town.

The winter here isn't very cold this year, averaging about ten degrees of frost, and not very much snow.

The town of Acton, C., occupies the railway station, which is also our residence, and the post office, of which Mrs. H. H. Storey is the postmistress, and the section house, which is occupied by my crew.

My nearest neighbor is a large stock ranch owned by Mr. H. H. Storey, brother to the Hon. Sir J. J. C. Abbott, late premier of Canada 1907-2. The population around here are mostly Indians, and white settlers.

There is plenty of scope for hunting and trapping all kinds of fur-bearing animals, trout fishing, etc. We get an occasional visit from the coyotes and should there be any chickens around you can raise the flock in that respect.

Well, I will close now, trusting you are in the best of health, as we are O. K. Following the Free Press and the town of Acton further success and greater prosperity in 1913.
