TWO GUELPH SOLDIERS KILLED

Ran Over by a Street Car Thursday Evening While Driving

Pte. John E. Galagan and Pte. Valley were instantly killed and their bodies terribly mangled while driving into Guelph from Niagara about eight o'clock last Thursday evening.

They appeared to be confused when they took the car and drove across the track immediately to the front of the car.

An inquest was held at which Galagan stated he had a talk with his mate to start and Preston to find out the condition of the deceased while away on the trip. He stated that Valley and Galagan had been drinking considerably while they were away, and that while in Galt and Preston on several occasions they narrowly missed being struck by the cars. At one time the rig had been driven over the switches at Preston and over the station platform. Before leaving for Guelph they had purchased a bottle of whiskey from a retail store in Preston.

A military funeral was held on Sunday.

The amount subscribed for the budget, which is principal for salaries, was \$1,035, an increase of \$358 over the sum total last year.

The canvas resulted in an addition of 63 contributions to the current revenue funds and 40 to the church budget.
