WAR TAX COMMENCES TO-DAY Its Relation to Railway and Steamship Tickets and Berths

The special War Iterenue Act, 1015, more commonly known as the War Tax, becomes effective to-day, April 13th. Important features in connection with its application on railway and steamship

The Act provides that the tax must be paid by the purchaser of the ticket, and that anyone refusing or neglecting to pay it is subject to a fine of not exceeding #50. The amount is 5 conts on every parlor car shat, and 10 cents on every sleeping




