#### EDITORIAL NOTES

NOTWITHSTANDING the submarine blockade and the fact that heretofore European customers are involved in war, Britain's trade for January, February, March and April totalled over \$2,000,000,000, showing an increase over the same month last year of \$1,000,000.

A STATEMENT from the Minister of Finance shows that the revenue from the special war stamp taxes from April 1 to July 1 will be about as follows: Bank note circulation, \$218,500; Trust and loan companies, \$33,000; Insurance companies, \$77,000; Money orders, letters, medicines, etc., \$1,483,000; Total, \$1,603,000.

#### FUNERAL OF MR. WM. BROWN

Many Friends Gather to Pay Last Tribute of Respect to His Memory

#### TENDER WORDS SPOKEN AT SERVICE

The funeral of the late William Brown last Friday, June 14th, was attended by a large number of friends and neighbours, anxious to pay this last tribute to the memory of the departed and to show their sympathy for the bereft family.

After a brief service at the residence the cortège proceeded to the Methodist Church, where for nearly a quarter of a century Mr. Brown was a most faithful attendant and a most useful official.

At the church service Rev. C. D. Draper, the pastor, was assisted by Rev. G. W. Barker, Chaplain, and Rev. J. C. Wilson, B.A., Knox Church.

We were at the afternoon service at the cathedral. It was all high church. Young lots of 12 to 14 years comprised the choir.

Was through Saltwood Castle last Saturday afternoon. It is about a mile from our camp.

It was here the two knights who murdered Thomas à Becket stayed the night previous to the murder. It is certainly interesting to visit this old historical place.

A fellow should study up his British history before coming to see these ancient places.
