Methods Used to Raise Money In Canada for the Red Cross.

The Government gets money for the war by the simple process of levying taxes or floating loans. Whether we wish to buy bullets or not, we are forced to spend our little money that we buy a postage stamp.

Cross organization, which exists for the preservation of life and the relief of misery, has to rely on our sympathy and instantaneous generosity. You can lend them the amount on the basis of cash down.

As a result, the Red Cross workers are appealing for our voluntary contributions to help them in their work. A glance at the sources of the money which flows into the coffers of the Red Cross Fund and of the aid which is distributed every week from the central shipping office in Toronto shows that the Red Cross, for the alleviation of misery, loves a little of our money and a little of our pleasure and charity and our entertainment, which is happily and cheerfully given.

Charles Spurgeon once spoke of collecting alms along the steps of the Lord. Similarly throughout Canada people are playing auction bridge, having other entertainments, and their pennies are going into the hands of the Red Cross, for the relief of the sick and the aged and the destitute. In fact, all the money that we give for the Red Cross, for the alleviation of misery, is happily and cheerfully given.

Our Canadian citizens have been particularly active in this humanitarian work. An amateur company in the city of Toronto has secured the best office receipts of two pieces, called "The Fight" and "The Hero" and has given a dramatic presentation of "The Fight" in Toronto. The students of the University of Toronto have given an entertainment of dramatic sketches for the relief of the Red Cross. In another part of the city a cinematograph was made to war a Red Cross appeal.

In this good work the Church has been the whole-hearted ally of the Red Cross. The churches are holding public meetings, carnivals, races, and public readings, in short by every means in their power to secure for the public taste and interest the Red Cross. It is contributing its quota to the war effort.
