We listen, we hear-

'I-love-dear-Canada,

Hir Frederick Fraser's Case Unique in Annals of Canadian Titles. Upper Canadlans . may possibly have wondered what manner of man this . Dr. C. F. Fraser, of Ralifax, was whom the King has delighted to honor. Outside of a few educationists, to whom his work has beec.no familiar, his name and achievements have not been generally known. Yet in Nova Hertia, Dr. Fraser in regarded as a great man' and never was a knighthood bestowed on anyone in the Province with more general natisfaction; ways W.

A. Craick in the Toronto Star Weekly. In the roster of Canada's titled citizens, filr Frederick France will be known as "the blind knight." Almost all of his sixty-five years have been spent in darkness. When a small boy, one of his eyes was seriously injured with a knife, and he became affected with sympathetic inflammation and soon after it too became uzeless. This tragedy of his life, however, did not daunt a brave spirit, and the blind boy determined to devote bimself all the more sealously to the improvement of his He went to the Perkins School for the Blind in Boston, where he proved himself to be an apt and eagor pupil and from there at the age of twenty-three, he returned to Hallfax to become superintendent of

the Halifax School for the Blind. Various causes lie at the back of knighthoods. Ostensibly conferred by the flovereign, they are often given for political or financial reasons, and the Crown merely sanctions the choice of the Ministry. It speaks volumes for the splendid work of Hir Frederick France on behalf of the education of the blind that his selection for the honor was made by H. R. H., the Governor-General personally, and because of the Duke of Connaught's Interest in and admiration for the institution that the blind knight has built up.

When Hir Frederick took charge of

the school over forty years ago it had but nine punits, and for a time the work languished, but after nine years of effort, the superintendent succeeded in securing a law making education free to the blind of the Province. To accomplish this resuit he went about addressing public mostings and stirring up public opinion in favor of the legislation. Then he visited the other Maritime Provinces and Newfoundland with similar results. The next step was to increase the accommodation of the school and improve the equipment. so that every blind child cost of Quebec might have a chance to learn. So successful was he in these endeavors that to-day the Halifax School for the Blind is fully the equal of any such school in the world, while in proportion to population, it reaches more pupils than any

Considering what Sir Frederick can do without the use of his eyes, he is to be reckened a wenderful man. So acute is his mind, so powerful his to make a man and not an encyclopaedia. I funcy, that it almost seems incredible that he cannot see. He moves about Halifax alone with astonishing ease. He has on occasions made long journoys by sail and water all unattended. In his quest for blind boys and girls in remote parts of the Maritime Provinces he has absorbed through the eyes and lips of others a knowledge of the character and even the appearance of the country that is positively astounding.

Air Frederick comes of worthy stock. His father, Dr. Benjamin ician greatly beloved throughout the countryside. His grandfathers, the Hon. James Fraser and the Hon. Joseph Allison, were both linifux merchants, who became members of the Nova Scotia Council of Twelve.


